

# Interpretation Award

## Inspired by... Sir Walter Scott



The Tay Landscape Partnership (TayLP) area, see below, has a rich and diverse history linked to its distinctive landscape. It is believed that since the area is rich in natural resources that it has been occupied and changed by humans over thousands of years. There are many stories to be told to celebrate the natural and cultural heritage of where the rivers Tay and Earn meet. The area and its stories have inspired poets, painters and novelists, perhaps most famously Sir Walter Scott. Through his novel 'The Fair Maid of Perth' he tells the story of Catharine Glover and Henry Gow who are drawn simultaneously into royal intrigue and highland feuds. His interpretation of the history of the area serves as the inspiration for this award.

### The Award

The Tay Landscape Partnership will offer an annual award of £500 to one student per year to support them in completing vocational and non-vocational qualifications in interpretation or oral history courses. This can be used for travel expenses, equipment, course fees and other resources.

The recipient will be required to:

- provide quarterly progress updates
- complete the course and deliver a report to the TayLP steering group within one year of the award being awarded
- deliver a talk or workshop on what they have been learning or have input into one of the TayLP projects

Applicants must be currently enrolled, or looking to enrol in courses in interpretation or oral history. They must submit the application outlining what they hope to achieve and how they plan on using the fund.

75% of the award will be paid to the successful applicant at the beginning of the project. The remainder will be paid two months before the end of the project on the completion of the 3rd progress report. All applicants should have a UK bank account.
